Attributes of B+ and A+ Writing (Expository)

A+ (Abstract writing)
Writing conveys a sense of the big picture, such as the overall purpose or message of a text, the role of the author/techniques, or the values and principles underpinning an argument
Adapts, alters or varies conventional structures to improve the expression of ideas through methods such as varying paragraph length, sentence length, topic sentence styles or positioning of evidence.
Routinely uses a range of nouns to label and describe the nuance and complexity of ideas. Abstract nouns are often the subject of sentences
Uses a wide range of ways to begin sentences which include participles (-ing, -ed words), adverbs, prepositions and conjunctions.
Advanced elaboration skills: Can write 2-4 sentences on the same idea, using a range of different adjectives, verbs and nouns to refer to the idea.
Sentences are routinely 20-30 words long - achieved through using multiple conjunctions, prepositions and clauses.
Routinely uses multiple, strong specific verbs in a sentence.
Uses a range of short quotes/examples, including multiple examples in the one paragraph.
